Our parish recently spent reflection time with the Bishop to identify our values, which are represented in the word map below. At this moment, we are evolving into a multigenerational and more ethnically diverse congregation. By reaching beyond boundaries, we are growing our influence within the Paso Robles community. Our community connections include preparing meals for the homeless (in conjunction with ECHO, El Camino Homeless Organization) and holding fundraisers for the Center for Family Strengthening.

St. James has developed and led several first communion classes taught by our Parish Administrator. Our strong lay leadership includes individuals licensed in preaching, service, and pastoral care, along with members engaged in many other areas of ministry and service.

Worship is at the heart of our life as a parish community. The liturgical depth and beauty of the Episcopal tradition nourishes us daily and weekly, through our Sunday and weekday services, which include bilingual elements. The framework of scripture, tradition and reason guide us as we celebrate the openness, courage, and diversity of the Episcopal church.



Paso Robles Community Profile

Welcome to Wine Country! Paso Robles has successfully grafted a world-class winery and high-end tourism scene onto a long and proud rural tradition of cattle, crops and self-reliance. St. James is a three-block walk from Downtown City Park, a vibrant public square of green surrounded by shops, restaurants and wineries.

The Paso Robles climate is Mediterranean: hot days and cool nights, sometimes with daily temperature swings of 40 degrees or more. We dress in layers and never have to shovel snow. Summer evenings are glorious for outdoor dining or sipping wine with friends. Rainfall occurs almost exclusively between November and May. Fresh produce from area farms is bountiful and varied.

Paso Robles is the northernmost of 7 cities in San Luis Obispo (SLO) County, located halfway between San Francisco and Los Angeles, 30 minutes from the Pacific Ocean.

Paso Robles is a friendly community of roughly 31,000 people, of which over a third are Latino/Hispanic and 22% speak Spanish at home. Nearly 28% of residents are seniors and 8% are veterans. Paso Robles is a politically diverse community, and St. James reflects this attribute.

Paso Robles was incorporated in 1889 and operates under the Council-Manager form of government. The City is a full-service city including emergency services, infrastructure, parks, a library, and a municipal general aviation airport aiming to become a horizontal spaceport, supported by a regional airport in neighboring San Luis Obispo.

Outdoor recreation is abundant, including road cycling, golf, horseback riding, mountain biking, and a water park, with Lake Nacimiento nearby. Each summer, the California Mid State Fair offers everything from Garth Brooks to Future Farmers of America auctioning their cattle, sheep and goats.

Award-winning Cuesta Community College has a satellite campus in Paso Robles, and Cal Poly San Luis Obispo consistently ranks among the top public undergraduate universities in the West. Paso Robles High School ranks near the upper third of high schools nationally.

For younger students, the school district offers transitional kindergarten and a well-respected dual language immersion program.

Paso Robles is now experiencing a growth surge with several new housing developments. These projects, currently in planning or construction, will add over 2,000 diverse new housing opportunities.

The congregation of St. James has 131 communicants in good standing, attending from Paso Robles and nearby communities. It is estimated to have an average age of 65 years with 22 under 16 years old. We are a majority white congregation actively seeking to better reflect our community's ethnic and generational diversity.


Average Sunday attendance is 62 persons (58 in person and 4 people online). Average weekday service attendance has been 11 (6 in person; 5 online). Facebook Live recordings of our Sunday services receive an average of 30 additional views in the following week.

History

Our beloved, historic church has served the Paso Robles area since 1892. We continue to celebrate services in the original church building, which is decorated throughout with dedicated stained glass windows. The separate guild hall, built in 1891, was expanded in the 1940's adding the classrooms and offices of today's parish hall.

Our sanctuary is home to the 1862 Williams Stevens organ, the oldest continuously used church organ on the "Pacific Coast of the Americas". Originally played in San Francisco, its move to St. James was overseen by the Very Rev. Charles Thackeray in the 1920's. As with many an elderly parishioner, the organ is both cherished and a little temperamental.

St. James has been integral to the growth of the community of Paso Robles. We've been feeding our community since Rev. Thackeray oversaw the launch of a soup kitchen during the Great Depression. Thackeray was also instrumental in starting the first Pioneer Days celebration—a civic festival first aimed at unifying farmers and "townies" that continues in the same spirit to this day.

In 1944, St. James was granted full parish status. Beginning during WWII, St. James hosted the "teen canteen" for youth in the area to enjoy fellowship in our parish hall. During the 1980's our then rector saw a community need for a food pantry and distribution that began at St. James and evolved into Loaves & Fishes, a local non-profit food bank.

From its inception, the St. James parish has been a champion for social justice, tolerance, and respect for human dignity in both congregation and community. As a 21st century church, our rectors have all exhibited these traits and have been our partners and leaders in a continued journey together in Christian fellowship.

The parish emerged from the COVID crisis with a renewed sense of purpose. The sheer joy of worshipping together again even on patchy grass inspired a parish initiative to create the new outdoor altar, labyrinth and reconstructed columbarium, among other other facility improvements.

Education and Our Expanding Community

Active education programs for both children and adults are integral to our work in Christian formation and evangelism.

Children's Programs

Our ministries to children have been growing in a way that both serves and expands our parish community and ministry in important ways. A few years back, our Parish Administrator discovered a family seeking religious training for their children to receive first communion. We welcomed them and developed a curriculum that serves a growing number of students each year. Our congregation's numbers are growing as these new families actively participate in after-service social gatherings, serving as acolytes and crucifers, while becoming more integral members of our parish.

As a maturing congregation, we feel blessed by these new members and are strongly invested in continuing to form and empower the next generation to carry our mission forward.

Adult Education Programs

In addition to weekly Zoom meetings to study scripture, we have adult continuing education courses that deepen our understanding of Jesus' words and actions. We recently gathered a group to read two books by Amy-Jill Levine, The Difficult Words of Jesus: A Beginner's Guide to His Most Perplexing Teachings, and Entering the Passion of Jesus: A Beginner's Guide to Holy Week. Our world religions class has focused recently on studying Judaism.

WORSHIP AND OUTREACH

Our community life springs from our worship in liturgy throughout the year. We have two Sunday Eucharistic services: one at 8:00 AM, Rite 1 without music, and another at 10:00 AM, Rite 2, which has a larger attendance, with Gospel and music in both English and Spanish. It is at this later service that we celebrate special days, including baptisms, first communions, and confirmations. This service typically draws a range of 45 to 65 congregants, while on holidays or special occasions, we are blessed to have standing-room-only gatherings. Congregational singing is accompanied on piano or organ by our part-time church musician, supplemented occasionally by a soloist, small choir, or instruments. The sounds of children are also music to our ears.

Our services are conducted almost exclusively in English, but several active families who first participated at St. James through the parish's First Communion classes speak Spanish as the primary language at home. Our bulletins routinely include text in Spanish for key elements such as the Lord's Prayer and the Creed. Lay Spanish-speakers (mostly non-Hispanic) take turns proclaiming the Gospel in Spanish each Sunday after the Deacon proclaims it in English. We are also expanding our repertoire of service music that the entire congregation sings in both Spanish and English.

From our 19th century beginnings, our prayer life and reflection have brought us to a commitment to outreach and serving those in need in the community. We work with other community charitable organizations in different ways, including feeding the homeless (~250 meals a month) and housing a community adult day care center in our rectory building.

We value building strong relationships with neighboring churches through outreach, education and worship. Recent collaborations with the Congregational Church next to us include quarterly Blood Drives and a joint presentation followed by a sensitive dialogue among fellow Christians of divergent political positions. We also share a liturgy and procession on Palm Sunday from the Paso Robles City Park to our churches.







STEWARDSHIP

For any community to thrive, each generation makes the tradition their own by bringing in their own experiences, talents, and charisma, thoughtfully reinterpreting tradition, and then in turn passing it along to the next generation.

Thanks to this attentive stewardship, St. James continues to thrive despite past challenges. The original building (cornerstone set in 1892) was damaged after several natural disasters. This inspired our community to rally and regroup, repairing not only the building but addressing disaster-caused difficulties in the community at large. The Church building itself requires a vigilant eye to anticipate and identify any potential maintenance issues. Our community has supported this work through financial and skilled support, so future generations can experience and enjoy life in the Episcopal tradition.

The church recently completed a much needed update of our columbarium and grounds. The grounds now include an area which combines an altar for outdoor worship, the columbarium where we honor our dead, and a patio area complete with a labyrinth for prayer, reflection, and celebrations. We offer this space for events for both St. James and the general community of Paso Robles. We envision this as an area for all Paso Roblans to gather whether in joy or sorrow, fulfilling our mission to witness in the world Christ's love.





Financial Status

St. James Church is financially sound, with no ongoing debt, a modest endowment, and prudent cash reserves to cover fluctuations in revenues or unexpected expenses. Typical budgets are lean, but include a full-time priest, a part-time musician and a parish administrator, plus contracts for bookkeeping and janitorial services. Fundraising supports mission work as well as ongoing expenses. As evidenced with the recent pledge statistics below, our church continues to grow in both numbers of members and the average pledge per parishioner.

A financial summary chart included below shows current information, but these periods are not typical – they reflect adjustments for the prior rector's requested ¾ status and the rector's planned retirement after Easter in 2025. Specifically, the current FY 2025 budget includes compensation for a parish administrator, part-time musician, and a supply priest serving as interim coverage for the remaining period of our

rector's part time status and retirement this year. The budget was also adjusted in January to what the remaining expenditures would be for the ¾ time position for the year on the "Rector Salary and Benefits" line item. The fiscal year 2026 and all future budgets will have funding for a full time Priest-In Charge, with all the related benefits.

The St. James Church Endowment and Investment Fund, while not included in the operating budget or financial statements, provides additional support when needed.

The financial statements and records are regularly examined by a diocesan reviewer who has consistently confirmed that our financial statements are accurately stated and that our accounting procedures are sound. Monthly financial reports are prepared by a professional bookkeeping service specializing in nonprofit and church accounting.


The budget estimate for FY 12/31/26 includes salary and benefits funding a full time rector.
